

Labor Day

While Labor Day is known as the "end of summer," the season of summer actually comes to an end on September 20th. Americans have traditionally wrapped up our summer excursion by Labor Day. The children have returned to school and many of our routine duties have begun. Of course, September is beautiful with warm days and cool nights.

This patriotic day is filled with relaxation, friends and family and/or an outdoor barbecue. Labor Day celebrates the common everyday worker

In the 19th century (1800's) Labor Day was established to honor labor unions and workers across our great country. Please recall that labor unions did not become official until 1935. In the 1800's and early 1900's labor unions experienced some great "wins." One such win is the 40-hour work week, company benefits, paid leave, sick leave and vacation time. Labor Day honors the common American worker who helped change the work force.

This special day of tribute to the American worker can be traced back to two Irishman: Peter J. and Matthew McGuire. The first unofficial Labor Day was celebrated on September 5, 1882, in New York City. By June 28, 1894, Congress passed an act, officially recognizing Labor Day on the first Monday of September for the whole country.

On September 2, 2024, Mass will be celebrated at 9 a.m. (no Mass at 12:10 p.m.) at St. Catherine Church in Broad Brook. Please be advised that on that day there will not be a 12:10 p.m. Mass. The Mass will be celebrated at 9 a.m.

The Sacrament of Penance Cont'd.

Last week we had a historical overview of the Sacrament of Penance, more commonly called <u>Reconciliation</u>. This title is so much appropriate since we are being <u>reconciled</u> to God in order to be in a "state of Grace" that is without venial or mortal sin.

Most Catholics refer to this Sacrament as "Confession" and indeed it is what we are doing...confessing our sins to be reconciled to God. However, the word "reconcile" places us in a positive light with Our Lord, because we seek to be unified with God who constantly runs after us to bring us into or back into the fold.

In this Sacrament the Faithful obtain Mercy from God for having offended Him. The problem is that the Church, for many years has not continued to teach its people about sin; the definition of sin; the fact that we do sin and the fact that Jesus spoke of sin ceaselessly, for it is why He came to earth in order to forgive our sins and to live with Him and be happy with Him forever.

The definition of sin is very simple...a turning away from God. Reconciliation and Penance turn us back to God and lead us into His good graces. Nevertheless, there are those who firmly believe that they don't sin. Well, according to the Letter of St. James (New Testament) if one doesn't sin, then one calls God a liar!! Is this where we want to be in our relationship with God?? That God is a liar?

Because we haven't taught sin for decades now, many Catholics feel as though they don't need to confess their sins or be reconciled to God by going to a priest. After all, the priest is also a sinner they argue. True, but the priest also has to go to a priest to be absolved of his sins.

In the Gospel of St. John, Jesus gives authority to the Apostles to forgive sins in His Name (Jn. 20).

There are two kinds of sorrow, both are appropriate for Reconciliation. One is <u>Imperfect Sorrow</u>. In this sorrow we seek reconciliation with God because we fear going to purgatory or hell. The other is called Perfect Sorrow.

This sorrow prompts us to seek reconciliation simply because we are sorry, we have offended God Himself. As stated above, both sorrows are acceptable. Most of the faithful, before they go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation experience one or the other of these sorrows.

It would be well for us to name the sins. One is <u>venial</u> and the other is <u>Mortal</u>. Most people have venial sins on their souls: impatience, swearing etc., etc. The mortal sin is worse because it completely separates us from God. One needs several things to commit a mortal sin: 1. One must know it is sinful; 2. One must meditate on committing the sin and 3. One must commit the sin.

While I stated the Church only asks us to be Reconciled to the Lord once -a-year. Mortal sins must be confessed and absolved as soon as possible! There is nothing stopping anyone from going to Confession as many times as they wish.

As a priest, I fear there is one mind set, which prevails in our society <u>today</u> ... that is...people believe they don't sin, and some Catholics believe they don't need to go to a priest. Read St. John's Gospel Chapter 20.
