

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament is a time when we Catholics (or anyone with a prayerful and sincere heart) worship the true God in the person of Jesus Christ who is really, truly, present in the eucharistic host. Catholics usually make what is known as a "holy hour" to honor Jesus' heartfelt request to His closest disciples during His lonely agony in the garden, Could you not spend one hour with me?

The worship of the Eucharist outside of the Mass is of inestimable value for the life of the Church. This worship is strictly linked to the celebration of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The presence of Christ under the sacred species reserved after Mass — a presence which lasts as long as the species of bread and of wine remain — derives from the celebration of the sacrifice and is directed towards communion, both sacramental and spiritual. Adoration is the first attitude of man acknowledging that he is a creature before his Creator. It exalts the greatness of the Lord who made us and the almighty power of the Savior who sets us free from evil. Adoration is homage of the spirit to the "King of Glory," respectful silence in the presence of the "ever greater" God.

The act of adoration outside Mass prolongs and intensifies all that takes place during the liturgical celebration itself. Indeed, "only in adoration can a profound and genuine reception mature. And it is precisely this personal encounter with the Lord that then strengthens the social mission contained in the Eucharist, which seeks to break down not only the walls that separate the Lord and ourselves, but also and especially the walls that separate us from one another."

Priests, Nuns, Sisters and Orders

Over the past 60 years the Catholic faithful may have forgotten the "ranks of order" in the Roman Catholic Church concerning those who profess the religious life. Certainly, the conversations might be somewhat confusing. Since the midsixties the Church herself shied away from giving attention to this aspect of Church life. Here is a small attempt to help in this endeavor.

First of all, priests of the Archdiocese are known as Archdiocesan Priests; but priests from the Diocese of Norwich, Bridgeport or Providence, RI are known as Diocesan priests. There is no difference in their priesthood. Their priesthood is either come from same. Thev Archdiocese or Diocese. For instance, Pope Francis is first and foremost ... a priest. He is also the Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Rome. However, he is a priest like any other priest who happens to be the Pope of the Universal Church. Technically, Nuns are in a Cloistered Convent and do not come out of a convent. Yes, they are referred to by the title "sister". Again technically "nuns" are cloistered. An example of this are the Benedictine Cloistered "nuns" of Regina Laudis Abbey in Bethlehem, CT. The head of the Abbey is an "Abbess". She has the authority of a bishop, within the Abby walls. She wears a bishop's ring and is allowed by canon law to perform some duties of a bishop. The same is true of the males in an Abbey. The Abbot takes on the duties of a bishop, at times, and also wears a bishop's ring. An example of this would be the cloistered Monastery of St. Joseph (Trappist) in Spencer, Ma.

"Sisters" are found in parish churches. Sometime ago there were hundreds of Sisters serving parishes. They kept the linens clean, taught C.C.D.(Catechism), lived in a convent next to the church. THEY ARE NOT NUNS, BECAUSE THEY ARE NOT CLOISTERED. They are "Sisters".

Lastly, there are missionaries, both priests and sisters. Their priesthood is the same as any other. The sisters are the same, too. But, they are on the mission all over the world to bring the Gospel <u>directly</u> to those whom they serve. <u>The Maryknoll Missionaries</u> of men and women are all over the world on this mission. Their priests and sisters are the same, but they have a special calling to the missions.

Hopefully this helps to explain some of the differences, but everyone is the same.
